Feast Days of the Week

Monday August 29 Beheading of John the Baptist

John the Baptist, a cousin of Jesus, was the last and greatest of the Old Testament prophets. When Jesus left to preach in Galilee, John continued preaching in the Jordan valley. Fearful of his great power with the people, Herod Antipas, Tetrarch of Perea and Galilee, had him arrested and imprisoned when John denounced his adulterous and incestuous marriage with Herodias, wife of his half brother Philip. John was beheaded at the request of Salome, daughter of Herodias, who asked for his head at the instigation of her mother.

Friday Sept 3 St Gregory the Great, Pope 540 - 604

'Gregory exercised a momentous influence on the doctrine, the organization, and the discipline of the Catholic Church. If no account were taken of his work, the evolution of the form of medieval Christianity would be almost inexplicable. And in so far as the modern Catholic system is a legitimate development of medieval Catholicism, of this too Gregory may not unreasonably be termed the Father. Almost all the leading principles of the later Catholicism are found, at any rate in germ, in Gregory the Great. He is honored as a Doctor of the Church.'

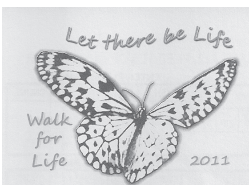

CareNet Walk For Life

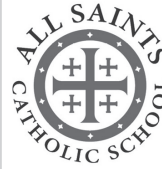
It was with rapt attention that Judy Van Swol's prolife message was received this past weekend at all the Masses. As was evident, she is dedi-

Changes in the Liturgy of the Mass

Beginning the 1st Sunday in Advent, The Roman Catholic Church in the United States and in all other English-speaking countries will begin using a new translation of the text of the Mass. Between now and the first Advent Sunday we will present these new texts and delve into the theological meaning behind these changes. The goal of these changes is fostering a deeper devotion and understanding of the Eucharistic liturgy.

The current language was published in 1973 by the International Committee for English in the Liturgy. It corresponds to the Latin Roman Missal (Novus Ordo of the Roman Missal --- 1969/70). Few changes have occurred since then. The Roman Missal is the liturgical book containing all of the prayers for the Mass as well as the instructions for what the priest is supposed to do. In the year 2000, Pope John Paul II approved the Third Edition of the Roman Missal. We will soon be using this version.

This new Missal added prayers for recently canonized saints, some new Masses for various intentions, and some additional prefaces. Also, adjustments were made to the General Instruction of the Roman Missal which were instituted six or seven years ago.

The new English translation is intended to preserve the "dignity, beauty, and doctrinal precision of the Latin texts using more sacred vocabulary. Between the 1970's and 2000, the text we have been using did not give a word-for-word translation of the original. It used more contemporary vocabulary. Some have argued that this has helped foster an attitude that the texts may be changed as time progresses.

This new Mass translation will be more literal than the one we currently use and may seem awkward. Over time, as we grow more familiar with the new translation we will find greater richness in the Mass prayers with the inclusion of Biblical references. Currently these references are obscured.

In future brochures and bulletin information we will present the new language of the Mass. These will be placed next to our current language so parishioners can become acquainted with the changes as they affect us. We will also examine differences in the new language and point out the theological significance whenever possible.

We expect the new translation, with the aid of the Holy Spirit and the intercession of the Mother of God, to help us with a fruitful renewal of spiritual growth.
