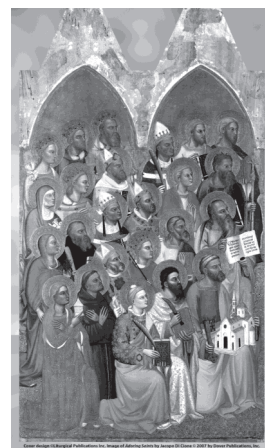

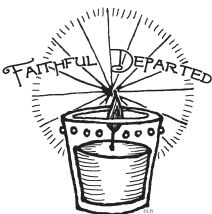
Commemoration of the Faithful Departed

Wednesday, November 2

When the battles of the Maccabees were won, they would pray for their fallen comrades to loose them from the sins they had died with. When asked the fate of those who died, Christ told his listeners of God's word to Moses: "I am the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob. He is not the God of the dead, but of the living." When writing to a Church in difficulty, Saint Paul said that we are surrounded by a cloud of believers, and that those who have passed before us, cheer us on in our own journey to heaven. Today, we remember all those who have gone before us. We strengthen our hope in the promise of eternal life. We recall the faithfulness of those who have died. And we pray for their union with God in heaven.

"Which commandment of the Law is the greatest?"

Today's Gospel reading revolves around the question: "Which commandment of the Law is the greatest?" Another way to put this question is to ask, "What do I need to do to achieve salvation?" It seems like a reasonable question. It certainly fits in with our computer motivated desire to find an instant solutions to a problem. "Tell me what to do, I'll do it and that's that." The only problem is serving God takes a lot more than a simple action. "Love God with your whole mind, your whole heart, and your whole soul, and love your neighbor as yourself," is more an attitude in life than a list of things to do.

Some so-called Catholics, argue, "I come to church to worship God. Spare me the message on the poor. I get that on the TV all week. This is "telephone booth theology": just me and God and nobody else. Here they obey the first part of great commandment and forget the second. Such people are deities but not Catholic. Other so-called Catholics operate on social worker principles. They put out for the poor not because it pleases God but because it pleases them. Jesus is squeezed out of the package. They obey the second part of great commandment and disregard the first. Such people are humanists but not Catholics. When one elephant in a herd is hurt, other elephants will help the injured animal stay on its feet. They crowd about the injured elephant and provide a shoulder for him to lean on. They follow herd instinct. Are they Catholics?

Jesus for the first time had taken the two concepts and made them two sides of one coin.

There is a story about a young man who was in great distress because he had loss a sense of God in his life. He complained to his elderly grandfather, "Why doesn't God let me feel His presence? If only I could feel Him and know that He has touched me." His grandpa said, "Pray to God, right now. Close your eyes and pray to him. Ask Him to put out His hand and touch you." The boy closed his eyes and prayed fervently. Then he felt a hand on his hand. "He touched me. He touched me," he cried out. Then he said, "You know, His hand felt just like your hand grandpa." "Of course it was my hand," his grandpa said. "That's how God works." He takes the hand that is nearest and uses that." And everyday God uses people to find him.

Ancient monk, Abba Anthony was once asked what his lifetime goals were. He answered that he wanted to become a Christian. Are we surprise, aren't we? His point is that Christianity is an ongoing process of becoming. Everyday we take steps to becoming a Christian.

Which commandment is the greatest? The commandment to be so close to God that we become His presence for others. We pray today that we might love God with our whole heart, our whole mind and whole soul, and then we will have no choice but to bring God's love to those around us.

The law and the prophets are summed up by loving God and loving neighbor. This is not something over and above our daily lives. It is the fabric of our lives. It is that which makes us who we are. Loving God and loving neighbor is the heart of our daily lives, the springboard of our actions, the basis of our decisions, the reason for our prayer life, the motivation of our lifestyle and the very reason why we are here this morning.

The Testimony of Catalina on the Holy Mass

Continued from last week

.... *And yet we know nothing of what will obtain for us a little bit of Heaven on earth and eventually, eternal life. And we call ourselves cultured men and women...!*

A moment later came the **Offertory**, and the Holy Virgin said: "**Pray like this:** (and I followed) **Lord, I offer all**



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that I am, all that I have, all that I can. I put everything into Your Hands. Build up Lord, with the little that I am. Transform me, God Almighty, through the merits of Your Son. I ask for my family, for my benefactors, for each member of our Apostolate, for all the

people who persecute us, for those who commend themselves to my poor prayers... Teach me to lay my heart down on the ground before them, so that their walk may be less hard... This is how the saints prayed; this is how I want all of you to pray." And this is how Jesus asks us

to pray, that we lay our hearts on the ground so that they [for whom we intercede] may not feel its harshness, but rather that we give them relief through the pain caused by their stepping on our hearts. Years later, I read a prayer booklet by a Saint whom I love dearly, José María Escrivá de Balaguer, and in that booklet I found a prayer similar to that which the Virgin Mary taught me. Perhaps this Saint, to whom I entrust myself, pleased the Virgin Mary with those prayers.
